Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: Imperial Canadian Diversified Income Pool (the *Pool*) seeks to generate income and potential capital growth by investing primarily in Canadian income-generating equity securities and debt securities.

Investment Strategies: The Pool employs a bottom-up, value-oriented investment strategy that gives dominant weighting to fundamental characteristics of individual stocks.

Risk

The Pool is a Canadian neutral balanced fund that is suitable for medium-term investors who can tolerate low investment risk.

For the period ended December 31, 2016, the Pool's overall level of risk remains as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The portfolio advisor of the Pool is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (*CAMI* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended December 31, 2016. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Pool's net asset value increased by 15% during the period, from \$685,910 as at December 31, 2015 to \$787,120 as at December 31, 2016. Net sales of \$6,388 and positive investment performance resulted in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Pool posted a return of 14.0% for the period. The Pool's primary benchmark, the S&P/TSX Composite Dividend Index (the *benchmark*), returned 24.0% for the same period. The Pool's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark.

Early in the period, as the global economic outlook worsened, the expectation for higher interest rates gave way to a low-to-negative interest-rate environment in a number of major financial markets. This

resulted in a weaker U.S. dollar during most of 2016. As a result, gold prices climbed over most of the year, and gold equities outperformed.

However, following the unexpected election of Donald Trump as U.S. president in November, there were expectations for higher U.S. economic growth, inflation, interest rates and government fiscal spending, along with lower corporate taxes. Consequently, the U.S. dollar appreciated and markets began to favour cyclical stocks over gold and other defensive and interest-rate-sensitive stocks.

Also late in the year, the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (*OPEC*), and some non-OPEC producers, struck an agreement to cut oil production for the first time in eight years, causing energy prices to recover from early-year lows.

As a result of these developments, Canada had the best-performing equity market among the developed economies in 2016, led primarily by the materials and energy sectors.

The Pool's large underweight position in the outperforming materials sector and small underweight position in the outperforming energy sector detracted from its performance. In addition, large overweight positions in the underperforming utility and telecommunication services sectors detracted.

Significant individual detractors from the Pool's performance included The North West Co. Inc., Alimentation Couche-Tard Inc. and Element Fleet Management Corp. North West's stagnant operational results caused relatively weak stock performance. The company has scaled back its growth capital expenditure program in order to control expenses, and the Portfolio Advisor expects it to maintain its above-average dividend yield. Shares of Alimentation Couche-Tard were flat as a result of equity issue concerns and expectations of a weaker fuel margins as energy prices rise. The company announced a number of acquisitions in 2016, which the Portfolio Advisor expects to materially increase future revenue and earnings growth. Element released stagnant earnings results and disappointing earnings guidance. The position is under review.

The Pool's large overweight position in the outperforming financials sector and large underweight position in the underperforming information technology sector contributed to its performance.

Significant individual contributors included Labrador Iron Ore Royalty, Manulife Financial Corp., and Vermilion Energy Inc. Labrador Iron Ore's share price rebounded from low 2015 levels as iron ore and related commodity prices increased over 2016. The expectation late in the year of higher interest rates resulted in a strong stock price recovery for Manulife. Vermilion benefited from the stronger energy price outlook.

In the period, the Portfolio Advisor added new holdings in North West and WSP Global Inc. Most of the North West retail outlets are in the less-competitive areas of northern Canada, Alaska, the South Pacific and the Caribbean, and the Portfolio Advisor expects modest earnings growth, steady dividend growth and above-average dividend yield. WSP Global was purchased in January and sold from the Pool in December to take profits. The share price appreciated sharply as infrastructure stocks rallied after the U.S. election.

Several of the Pool's existing holdings were increased, including TransCanada Corp., Keyera Corp., Altagas Ltd. and Manulife. The Pool participated in TransCanada's equity issue to help fund the acquisition of Columbia Pipeline Group Inc., and the Portfolio Advisor expects further dividend growth. Keyera has more than \$1.6 billion worth of approved capital projects in 2016–18, which could result in above-average cash flow and dividend growth. AltaGas's utilities and contracted power generation operations are stable, and the company is building a liquefied petroleum gas export facility on the Canadian west coast. Manulife was trading at an attractive discount to book value, and has a solid capital position and secure dividend yield.

Empire Co. Ltd. was eliminated from the Pool as a result of its exposure to the intensely competitive environment in the challenging western Canadian economy, which affected its operational and profitability outlook.

The Portfolio Advisor reduced the Pool's existing holding in Brookfield Asset Management Inc. amid concerns about its fee-revenue business and the growth of assets under management in a low interest-rate environment. The Pool took some profits on Cineplex Inc., on the view that capital appreciation is limited as the company diversifies away from box-office revenues and into other media businesses. Profits were also taken in Canadian Natural Resources Ltd. after strong year-to-date performance combined with concerns about a reversal in the energy price recovery. The Pools' overweight holdings in Canadian National Railway Co. and Canadian Utilities Ltd. were trimmed.

Recent Developments

Effective April 27, 2016, the composition of the Independent Review Committee (*IRC*) changed. John Crow resigned his position as member and Chair. Marcia Lewis Brown was appointed as member and Don Hunter was appointed as Chair.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (*CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Pool, and

receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager

CIBC is the Manager of the Pool. CIBC receives management fees with respect to the day-to-day business and operations of the Pool. The Pool pays the Manager a maximum annual management fee rate of 0.25% of the net asset value of the Pool, as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*.

Trustee

CIBC Trust Corporation (*CIBC Trust*), a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the trustee (the *Trustee*) of the Pool. The Trustee holds title to the property (cash and securities) of the Pool on behalf of its unitholders.

Portfolio Advisor

The portfolio advisor provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Pool. CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the portfolio advisor of the Pool.

Discretionary Managers

As at the date of this report, units of the Pool are offered through discretionary investment management services provided by certain subsidiaries of CIBC (collectively, the *Discretionary Managers*). The Discretionary Managers may include CIBC Trust and CAMI. The Discretionary Managers arrange to purchase, switch, and redeem units of the Pool on behalf of their clients who have entered into discretionary investment management agreements with one of the Discretionary Managers. The Discretionary Managers are the registered unitholders of the Pools for the purposes of receiving all unitholder materials and having the right to vote all proxies with respect to units of the Pool. Units of the Pool are also offered to investors in connection with certain products offered by affiliated dealers pursuant to the terms of the account agreements governing such products. There are no compensation arrangements with these dealers in respect of the sale of units of the Pool. However, CIBC Trust receives fees from its clients for offering discretionary management services and, from these fees, CIBC Trust may pay affiliated dealers and other CIBC members for services provided in connection with the client's discretionary investment managed account, which may hold units of the Pool.

CIBC receives fees from CIBC Trust for the services of CIBC advisors that assist investors with opening discretionary investment management accounts where CIBC Trust acts as the Discretionary Manager and for acting as the investors' ongoing relationship manager. CIBC is responsible for the remuneration of the CIBC advisors and may pay the CIBC advisors out of such fees. Further details of the arrangement between CIBC and CIBC Trust may be found in the discretionary investment management agreement between CIBC Trust and investors. CAMI receives fees from their clients for offering discretionary investment managed accounts, which may hold units of the Pool, and may pay a portion of such fees to their investment counsellors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor makes decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor to CIBC World Markets Inc. (CIBC WM) and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and other securities and certain derivative products to the Pool. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the type and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services other than order execution to the Portfolio Advisor in partial exchange for processing trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor with investment decision-making services for the Pool or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Pool.

In addition, CIBC may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Pool. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Pool.

During the period, the Pool did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Pool Transactions

The Pool may enter into one or more of the following transactions (the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- invest in or hold debt securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor purchased in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (a Related Dealer) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);

- purchase equity or debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty; and
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate of the Manager.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred or reported to the IRC by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with conditions of its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the custodian of the Pool (the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Pool and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Pool including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The Custodian may hire sub-custodians for the Pool. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Pool are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Pool during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Pool on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (*CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Pool, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Pool on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

¹ This information is derived from the Pool's audited annual financial statements. The Pool adopted International Financial Reporting Standards (*IFRS*) on January 1, 2014. Previously, the Pool prepared its financial statements in accordance with Canadian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (*GAAP*) as defined in Part V of the CPA Canada Handbook. Under Canadian GAAP, the Pool measured fair values of its investments in accordance with CICA Handbook Section 3855 which required the use of bid prices for long positions and ask prices for short positions. As such, the net assets per unit figure presented in the financial statements may differ from the net asset value calculated for fund pricing purposes. An explanation of these differences can be found in the notes to the financial statements issued prior to January 1, 2014. Upon adoption of IFRS, the Pool measures the fair value of its investments by using the close market prices, where the close market price falls within the bid-ask spread. As such, the Pool's accounting policies for measuring the fair value of investments in the financial statements are consistent with those used in measuring the net asset value for transactions with unitholders. Accordingly, the opening net asset figure as at January 1, 2013 was restated to reflect accounting policy adjustments made in accordance with IFRS. All figures presented for periods prior to January 1, 2013 were prepared in accordance with Canadian GAAP and subsequent thereto were prepared in accordance with IFRS.

² Net assets and distributions are based on the actual number of units outstanding at the relevant time. The total increase (decrease) from operations is based on the weighted average number of units outstanding during the period.

³ Distributions were paid in cash, reinvested in additional units of the Pool, or both.

⁵ Management expense ratio is based on the total expenses of the pool (excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs), incurred by or allocated to a class of units for the period shown, expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value of that class during the period.

⁶ The decision to waive and/or absorb management fees and operating expenses is at the discretion of the Manager. The practice of waiving and/or absorbing management fees and operating expenses may continue indefinitely or may be terminated at any time without notice to unitholders.

⁷ The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs before income taxes expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value during the period. Spreads associated with fixed income securities trading are not ascertainable and, for that reason, are not included in the trading expense ratio calculation.

⁸ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the portfolio advisor and/or portfolio sub-advisor manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to a fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by a fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The Pool, either directly or indirectly, pays an annual management fee to CIBC to cover the costs of managing the Pool. Management fees are based on the net asset value of the Pool and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CIBC in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor(s) are paid by CIBC out of the management fees received from the Pool. The Pool is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CIBC. Refer to the Simplified Prospectus for the maximum annual management fee rate.

For the period ended December 31, 2016, 100% of the management fees collected from the Pool was attributable to general administration, investment advice, and profit.

Past Performance

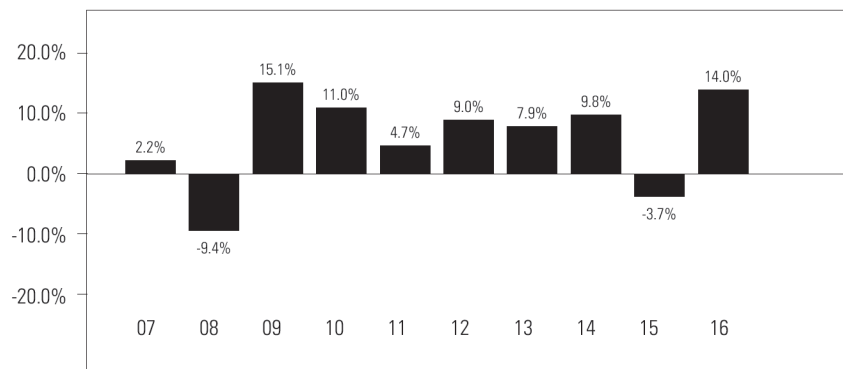
