Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: CIBC Canadian Small-Cap Fund (referred to as the *Fund*) seeks to provide long-term growth through capital appreciation by investing primarily in small and medium-sized Canadian companies judged to be undervalued or that have above-average growth potential.

Investment Strategies: The Fund identifies stocks with sustainable growth characteristics from among a universe of primarily small- to mid-capitalization Canadian stocks that trade at reasonable valuations. The Fund aims to add value through prudent security selection based on fundamental, bottom-up analysis.

Risk

The Fund is a Canadian small/mid-cap equity fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate medium to high investment risk.

For the period ended December 31, 2020, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The Fund's portfolio advisor is CIBC Asset Management Inc. (referred to as *CAMI* or the *Portfolio Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended December 31, 2020. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 10% during the period, from \$131,911 as at December 31, 2019 to \$145,225 as at December 31, 2020. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$16,128, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 25.1% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Small-Cap Index (referred to as the *benchmark*), returned 12.9% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

Canada's economy entered a recession in the second quarter of 2020, as lockdowns in response to the COVID-19 pandemic began to significantly hinder economic activity in late March. Canada's gross domestic product (referred to as *GDP*) fell at a record pace in the second quarter. In the third quarter as lockdown restrictions eased and the economy reopened, Canada's economy expanded at its fastest pace on record. However, Canadian GDP contracted again in October, as COVID-19 infection rates continued to climb and new lockdown restrictions were imposed.

In response to the substantial weakening of economic conditions, the Bank of Canada (referred to as the *BoC*) reduced its central interest rate three times in March, by 50 basis points each time. This reduced the BoC's benchmark overnight interest rate to 0.25%. The BoC expects to maintain this low interest rate until its inflation target is achieved, which the BoC expects to take a few years. The BoC also implemented a bond-buying program to help the economy and ensure the proper functioning of financial markets.

After substantial declines in March, Canadian equity markets rebounded and ended the period up slightly, while U.S. equity markets ended the period up substantially. The approval and distribution of several vaccines late in the period boosted economic activity. With hopes of an end to the pandemic and an economic recovery, investors moved back into cyclical sectors, which had experienced a steep sell-off earlier in 2020.

Stock selection in the health care, information technology and materials sectors contributed to the Fund's performance. Individual contributors to performance included Dye & Durham Ltd., Andlauer Healthcare Group Inc. and Cargojet Inc. Dye & Durham's shares appreciated after the company's initial public offering as the company allocated over \$500 million toward acquisitions with significant opportunity to build value. Andlauer appreciated in value as investors responded positively to the resilience of the company's business model through the pandemic. Cargojet experienced increased demand for air cargo as a result of growth in e-commerce combined with grounded flights resulting in a lack of cargo availability on passenger aircrafts.

An underweight exposure to – and stock selection in – the consumer discretionary sector detracted from the Fund's performance. Many lower-quality consumer discretionary companies rallied in the second half of the period as markets anticipated an economic recovery. Stock selection in the energy sector also detracted from performance.

Individual detractors from performance included Diversified Royalty Corp., Cominar REIT and Dexterra Group Inc. Many of Diversified Royalty's royalty stream partners were materially impacted by the pandemic, putting the company's dividend into question. A senior member of management left Cominar abruptly, and the company's ability to maintain its operating momentum was called into question. Lower energy prices put pressure on the energy services segment of Dexterra's business.

Several new holdings were added to the Fund during the period, including Dye & Durham. The company's technology solutions are disrupting the business and law industries, and Dye & Durham has the opportunity to consolidate a very fragmented market. The Portfolio Advisor believes WillScot Mobile Mini Holdings Corp. can achieve revenue and cost synergies following its merger with Mobile Mini, Inc. Gatos Silver Inc. was added as the Portfolio Advisor believes the company is on the verge of production at a silver mine in Mexico that operates at a relatively low cost and generates a higher grade than its competitors' assets.

The Portfolio Advisor added to the Fund's existing holdings in Real Matters Inc. and Equitable Group Inc. Real Matters stock sold off in response to a widely disappointing data strategy, but the Portfolio Advisor believes the company has an opportunity to capitalize on mortgage refinancing volume in the U.S., as well as further penetration in the title market. The Portfolio Advisor believes Equitable Bank is well positioned to capitalize on strong end-consumer dynamics in Canada.

Several of the Fund's holdings were eliminated during the period, including OneSoft Solutions Inc., which the Portfolio Advisor believes is at a riskier stage of its business model development. The valuation of Pinnacle Renewable Energy Inc. had increased to the point where the Portfolio Advisor no longer believes the company offers a solid risk-reward opportunity.

The Portfolio Advisor trimmed the Fund's holding in Akumin Inc. after a period of strong stock price performance. The Fund's holding in Champion Iron Ltd. was reduced after the company announced a phase-two expansion and had benefited from higher iron ore prices, which resulted in a substantial increase in the company's share price.

Recent Developments

On July 6, 2020, Class F units of the Fund were made available for purchase.

The composition of the Independent Review Committee (referred to as *IRC*) changed. Don Hunter and Merle Kriss retired effective April 26, 2020. Effective April 27, 2020, David Forster and Deborah Leckman were appointed as members of the IRC. Marcia Lewis Brown was appointed Chair effective April 1, 2020.

The international spread of COVID-19 caused a significant slowdown in the global economy and volatility in financial markets. The COVID-19

outbreak may adversely affect global markets and the Fund's performance.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager

CIBC is the Fund's manager (referred to as the *Manager*). CIBC receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*. The Manager compensates its wholesalers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CIBC may invest in units of the Fund.

Trustee

CIBC Trust Corporation, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's trustee (referred to as the *Trustee*). The Trustee holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders.

Portfolio Advisor

The portfolio advisor provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's portfolio advisor.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CIBC's related dealers such as the principal distributor, CIBC Securities Inc. (referred to as *CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Investor Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI, and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CIBC may pay trailing commissions to these dealers and firms, except for CIBC SI, in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors. CIBC does not pay trailing commissions to CIBC SI for selling units of the Fund, although overall sales of CIBC funds may be considered in assessing the performance of their advisors and may therefore contribute to their annual compensation.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor makes decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income securities and other securities and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices

for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the type and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor in partial exchange for processing trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund.

In addition, CIBC may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund paid brokerage commissions and other fees of \$38,488 to CIBC WM; the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate; and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect

of a purchase or redemption on units in the fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred or reported to the IRC by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with a condition imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the Fund's custodian (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The Custodian may hire sub-custodians for the Fund. The fees and spreads for services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager, and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by a fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays CIBC an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CIBC in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses and trailing commissions are paid by CIBC out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CIBC. Refer to the Simplified Prospectus for the annual management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended December 31, 2020. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

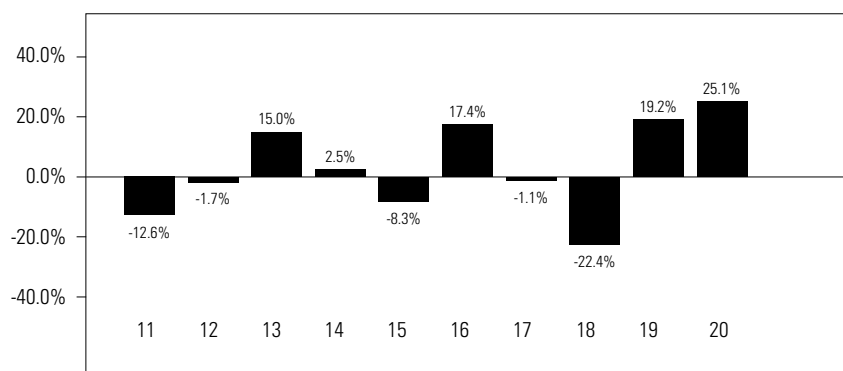
