Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: CIBC International Small Companies Fund (referred to as the *Fund*) seeks to provide long-term growth through capital appreciation by investing primarily in smaller companies located around the world.

Investment Strategies: The Fund uses a bottom-up approach for company selection based on individual merits, giving consideration to themes and trends that may impact future performance. The approach identifies companies that exhibit extraordinary growth potential or that are undervalued based on established parameters.

Risk

The Fund is a global small/mid cap equity fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate medium to high investment risk.

For the period ended December 31, 2020, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The Fund's portfolio sub-advisor is American Century Investment Management, Inc. (referred to as the *sub-advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended December 31, 2020. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 10% during the period, from \$35,205 as at December 31, 2019 to \$38,866 as at December 31, 2020. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$4,596, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 26.4% for the period. The Fund's benchmarks, the MSCI EAFE Index and the MSCI EAFE Small-Cap Index (referred to as the *benchmarks*), returned 6.4% and 10.8%, respectively, for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmarks' returns. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

Although the global economy and financial markets began 2020 relatively strong, measures to contain the spread of COVID-19 hindered economies around the world. In response, central banks and governments implemented massive monetary and fiscal stimulus programs, including substantial asset purchases, to support their respective economies and financial markets.

The spring economic slowdown reduced demand for commodities, which, in combination with oversupply, led to a brief period of negative crude oil prices. Equity prices fell sharply in March before rallying in response to the unprecedented stimulus programs, which kept global yields at historically low levels. The price of gold reached record highs.

Investor optimism in the second half of 2020 supported equity prices, as well as a recovery in commodity prices. Despite high COVID-19 infection rates, this optimism was fuelled by hopes of economic re-openings and progress toward the widespread distribution of effective COVID-19 vaccines. Other forces driving stronger equity prices included the resolution of the U.S. election, expectations of a trade deal between the U.K. and European Union, and a limit on oil output by the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (referred to as *OPEC*).

International developed markets equities posted gains over the year despite the significant economic disruptions stemming from the spread of COVID-19. Small-capitalization stocks outperformed large-cap stocks, while growth stocks outperformed value stocks over the period.

The Fund's stock selection in, and slight overweight exposure to, the outperforming information technology sector contributed to performance. Stock selection in the consumer discretionary sector also contributed to the Fund's performance. In country terms, stock selection in Japan contributed to performance.

Individual contributors to the Fund's performance included A-Living Smart City Services Co. Ltd., Seegene, Inc. and HelloFresh SE. China-based property manager A-Living Smart City Services benefited from an economic rebound in China after its lockdowns were lifted. The company also reported strong fiscal-year results and a positive outlook. South Korea-based life sciences company Seegene developed a

time-efficient COVID-19 diagnostic test that was in high demand as the virus spread worldwide. Meal delivery services company HelloFresh experienced strong demand as a result of pandemic-related lockdown orders. All three stocks were sold from the Fund after a period of strong performance.

Underweight exposures to the energy and utilities sectors detracted from the Fund's performance. In country terms, the Fund's holdings in Brazil detracted from performance.

Individual detractors from the Fund's performance included Azul S.A., Bank BTPN Syariah TBK PT and Randon SA Implementos e Participações. South American airline company Azul reported weaker-than-expected results as a result of lower fare increases. The company's management also indicated that capacity increases and profitability would likely be at the low end of its guidance range. The Fund's position in Azul was sold during the period. Shares of Indonesia-based Bank BTPN Syariah weakened in response to heightened economic uncertainty and credit risk stemming from the pandemic. The position was also sold from the Fund during the period. Shares of Randon, which owns heavy equipment vehicle manufacturers, automotive parts suppliers and other businesses, declined after the company warned that the economic slowdown might weaken its export revenues.

A new holding in Sweden-based Samhällsbyggnadsbolaget i Norden AB was added to the Fund during the period. The sub-advisor believes this well-managed residential real estate management company owns high-quality assets and benefits from a recession-resistant business model. The sub-advisor believes the company's recent acquisition of Hemfosa Fastigheter AB, the second-largest community service property company in the Nordic countries, may support sustainable earnings growth.

The Fund's existing holding in Element Fleet Management Corp. was increased during the period. This provider of automotive fleet management services reported better-than-expected growth in revenue and earnings per share. The company announced that while Amazon.com Inc. will now self-finance its own fleet, Element Fleet Management will continue to service that fleet.

The Fund's holding in GSX Techedu Inc. was eliminated in favour of stocks that the sub-advisor believes offer more attractive risk-reward profiles. The stock performed well early in the year, but declined in May after a short seller's report questioned GSX Techedu's user numbers.

The sub-advisor trimmed the Fund's holding in GDS Holdings Ltd. after a period of strong stock performance. This technology company develops and manages high-performance data centres in China, where it is benefiting from growth in cloud computing and digital traffic.

Recent Developments

On July 6, 2020, Class F units of the Fund were made available for purchase.

The composition of the Independent Review Committee (referred to as *IRC*) changed. Don Hunter and Merle Kriss retired effective April 26, 2020. Effective April 27, 2020, David Forster and Deborah Leckman were appointed as members of the IRC. Marcia Lewis Brown was appointed Chair effective April 1, 2020.

The international spread of COVID-19 caused a significant slowdown in the global economy and volatility in financial markets. The COVID-19 outbreak may adversely affect global markets and the Fund's performance.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager

CIBC is the Fund's manager (referred to as the *Manager*). CIBC receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*. The Manager compensates its wholesalers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CIBC may invest in units of the Fund.

Trustee

CIBC Trust Corporation, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's trustee (referred to as the *Trustee*). The Trustee holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders.

Portfolio Advisor

The portfolio advisor provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's portfolio advisor (referred to as the *Portfolio Advisor*).

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CIBC's related dealers such as the principal distributor, CIBC Securities Inc. (referred to as *CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Investor Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI, and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CIBC may pay trailing commissions to these dealers and firms, except for CIBC SI, in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors. CIBC does not pay trailing commissions to CIBC SI for selling units of the Fund, although overall sales of CIBC funds may be considered in assessing the performance of their advisors and may therefore contribute to their annual compensation.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, to CIBC WM and CIBC World

Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and other securities and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the type and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, in partial exchange for processing trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, CIBC may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty;

- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate; and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption on units in the fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred or reported to the IRC by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with a condition imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the Fund's custodian (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions initiated by CAMI as the Portfolio Advisor are paid by CAMI and/or the dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading by CAMI on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays CIBC an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CIBC in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor(s) are paid by CIBC out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CIBC. Refer to the Simplified Prospectus for the annual management fee rate.

The following table shows a breakdown of the services received in consideration of the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Fund for the period ended December 31, 2020. These amounts do not include waived fees or absorbed expenses.

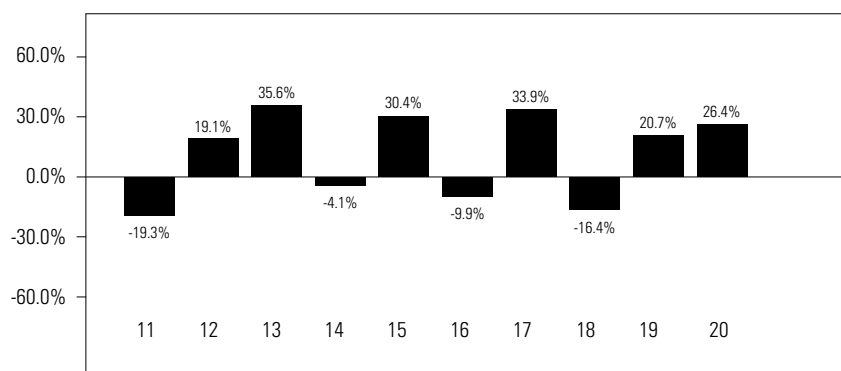

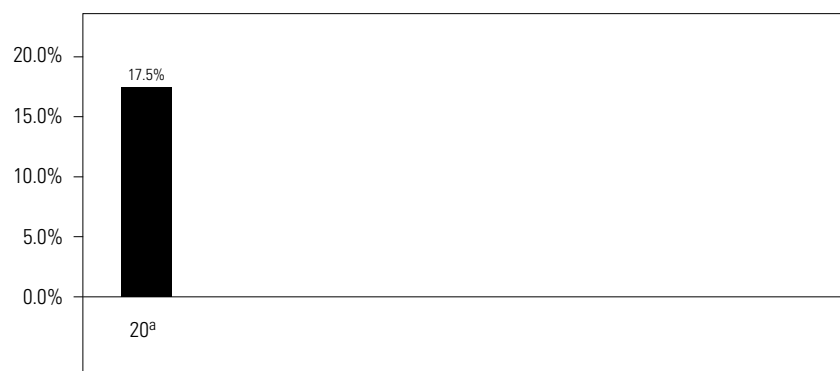
Year-by-Year Returns
