Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: CIBC U.S. Small Companies Fund (the *Fund*) seeks to provide long-term growth through capital appreciation by investing primarily in smaller U.S. companies, including equity securities of publicly traded companies listed on U.S. stock exchanges.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests primarily in securities of companies that have sustainable competitive advantages, which are judged to be attractively valued based on fundamental research.

Risk

The Fund is a U.S. small/mid-cap equity fund that is suitable for long term investors who can tolerate medium to high investment risk.

For the period ended December 31, 2024, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The Fund's portfolio sub-advisor is Kayne Anderson Rudnick Investment Management, LLC (the *Sub-Advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended December 31, 2024. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 18% during the period, from \$621,788 as at December 31, 2023 to \$736,330 as at December 31, 2024. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$1,101, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 16.0% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the Russell 2500 Index (the *benchmark*), returned 22.2% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

At the beginning of 2024, the market had priced in modest gross domestic product (GDP) growth and more than six interest-rate cuts from the U.S. Federal Reserve Board (the *Fed*). Instead, GDP came in at double the expected rate of growth and the Fed made just three

interest-rate cuts for the year. Much of the strength seen in the U.S. economy was attributed to a healthy labour market that cooled just enough for the Fed to start lowering the federal funds target rate.

Following the November election, business confidence improved. The labour market remained solid, although not heated. New hires and job openings continued to be strong, and the unemployment rate remained low. Corporate debt levels were slightly above long-term averages but appeared manageable.

Inflation declined but was not completely tamed. There was continued strength in prices, notably in the services sector, which contributed to wage increases that were higher than the overall inflation rate. The increase in wages played a large role in the U.S. economy's resilience, while strength in the services sector helped to keep inflation above the Fed's 2% target.

Stock selection in and overweight allocations to the information technology and consumer discretionary sectors detracted from the Fund's performance. A holding in Nordson Corp. detracted from performance. The company completed a large acquisition in 2023 that has not performed up to management expectations. It also faced declining revenue due to end-market weakness and supply chain customers taking a conservative approach to inventory purchase patterns.

Charles River Laboratories International Inc. was another individual detractor from performance. Its customer base of biotech firms continued to struggle with funding given the higher-interest-rate environment. A holding in Universal Display Corp. detracted from performance after it announced a delay in the commercialization of its blue organic light-emitting diodes (OLEDs).

Stock selection in and an underweight allocation to the financials sector contributed to the Fund's performance. Underweight exposure to the materials sector also contributed to performance. A holding in Interactive Brokers Group Inc. was a top individual contributor to performance. The company delivered consistent revenue and profit growth, increasing its customer count, particularly among foreign investors seeking to access U.S. stock markets.

The Fund's holding in Fair Isaac Corp. contributed to performance after it delivered solid growth in a weak lending environment. Another top contributor to performance was Lennox International Inc. The company benefited from improving demand in its residential heating, air conditioning and ventilation (HVAC) business and continued to deliver strong growth in its commercial HVAC business. It also saw improvements in its corporate profitability.

The Sub-Advisor added a new holding in BJ's Wholesale Club Holdings Inc. to the Fund based on its scale. The company has benefited from consumers looking for better prices in an inflationary environment, and from its membership gains during the COVID-19 pandemic, when other retailers had supply chain issues.

Universal Display was added to the Fund for its leadership position in phosphorescent OLEDs. The company offers high-quality materials at scale with a proven track record of performance. It should continue to benefit from growing industry demand, in the Sub-Advisor's view.

The Sub-Advisor also added Ollie's Bargain Outlet Holdings Inc. to the Fund based on its ability to access large deals that smaller closeout retailers cannot match. The company has established a reputation for being able to place merchandise and sell it rapidly without damaging valuable brands.

An existing holding in Choice Hotels International Inc. was increased after its stock declined in response to its proposed takeover of Wyndham Hotels & Resorts Inc. The company ultimately cancelled the deal, and the Sub-Advisor added to the holding at a lower share price.

ANSYS Inc. and Dolby Laboratories Inc. were eliminated to fund other purchases. Exponent Inc. was trimmed to manage its weighting within the Fund. Fair Isaac Corp. was reduced following strong share price performance.

Recent Developments

The level of geopolitical risk disrupted the global economy and financial markets in unprecedented and unpredictable ways. This has resulted in significant volatility and uncertainty in financial markets. It is unclear what further actions may be taken by governments and the resulting impact on global economies, businesses and financial markets. Inflation has increased in many markets across the globe, leading central banks to raise interest rates in order to counter rapidly rising prices. These factors may adversely affect the Fund's performance. The Manager continues to monitor ongoing developments and the impact to investment strategies.

Related Party Transactions

CIBC and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager

CIBC is the Fund's manager (the *Manager*). CIBC receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in *Management Fees* section. From time to time, CIBC may invest in units of the Fund.

The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain fund costs) in respect of the class of units of the Fund (except class O

unit), which may include but are not limited to, operating and administrative costs; regulatory fees; audit, and legal fees and expenses; trustee, safekeeping, custodial, and any agency fees; and investor servicing costs and costs of unitholder reports, prospectuses, Fund Facts, and other reports, in exchange for the Fund paying a fixed rate administration fee (plus applicable GST/HST) to the Manager with respect to those class of units. For class O units, no fixed administration fee will be charged. The Manager pays the Fund's operating expenses (other than certain Fund costs) allocated to Class O units of the Fund. The fixed administration fee payable by the Fund, may, in any particular period, exceed or be lower than the expenses we incur in providing such services to the Fund.

Trustee

CIBC Trust Corporation (*CIBC Trust*), a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's trustee (the *Trustee*). The Trustee holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders.

Portfolio Advisor

The portfolio advisor provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's portfolio advisor.

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CIBC's related dealers such as the principal distributor, CIBC Securities Inc. (*CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (*CIBC IS*), the CIBC Imperial Investor Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (*CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI, and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CIBC may pay trailing commissions to these dealers and firms, in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and other securities and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the type and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, in partial exchange for processing trades through them (referred to in the industry as "soft dollar" arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor

and any portfolio sub-advisors, with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

During the period, the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (*Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (the *Related Dealer* or *Related Dealers*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a "private placement" offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate; and
- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption of units in the fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred or reported to the IRC by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with a condition imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the Fund's custodian (the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other

services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions by the Fund are paid by CAMI and/or the dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager, in return for receiving a fixed administration fee from the Fund. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

The Custodian also provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. The Manager receives a fixed administration fee from the Fund, in return, the Manager pays certain operating expenses which includes custodial fees (including all applicable taxes) and the fees for fund accounting, reporting, and fund valuation (including all applicable taxes) to CIBC Mellon Trust Company. Where applicable, securities lending fees are applied against the revenue received by the Fund.

¹ This information is derived from the Fund's audited annual financial statements.² Net assets and distributions are based on the actual number of units outstanding at the relevant time. The total increase (decrease) from operations is based on the weighted average number of units outstanding during the period.³ Distributions were paid in cash, reinvested in additional units of the Fund, or both.⁴ This information is presented as at December 31 of the period(s) shown.⁵ Management expense ratio is based on the total expenses of the Fund (excluding commissions and other portfolio transaction costs), incurred by or allocated to a class of units for the period shown, expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value of that class during the period. The management expense ratio includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds, where applicable.⁶ The decision to waive management fees and/or fixed administration fees is at the discretion of the Manager. The practice of waiving management fees and/or fixed administration fees may continue indefinitely or may be terminated at any time without notice to unitholders. The management expense ratio before waivers or absorptions includes the fees attributable to exchange traded funds, where applicable.⁷ The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs before income taxes expressed as an annualized percentage of the daily average net asset value during the period. Spreads associated with fixed income securities trading are not ascertainable and, for that reason, are not included in the trading expense ratio calculation.⁸ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the portfolio advisor and/or portfolio sub-advisor manages the portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the period. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a period, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of the Fund.

Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays CIBC an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CIBC in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses and trailing commissions are paid by CIBC out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CIBC. Refer to the Simplified Prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units. For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

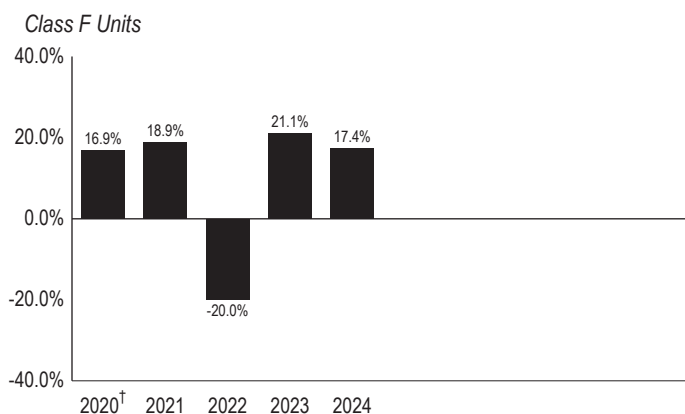
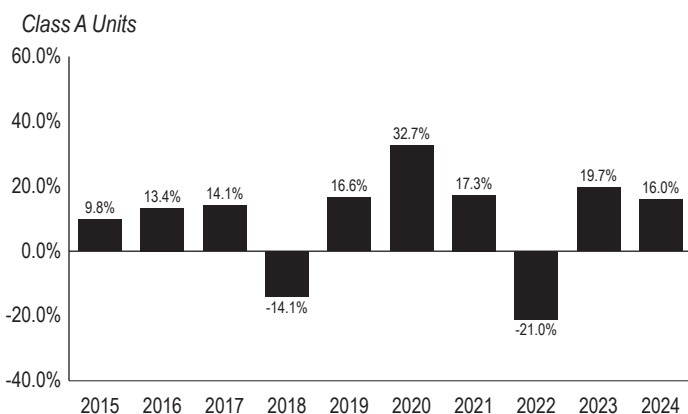
Past Performance

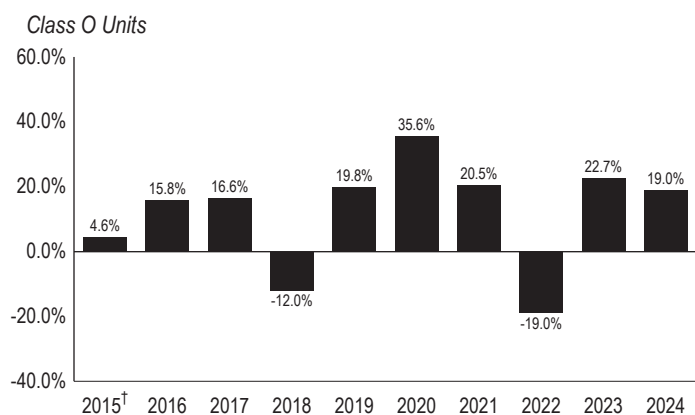
