Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

Investment Objective: CIBC U.S. Small Companies Fund (referred to as the *Fund*) seeks to provide long-term growth through capital appreciation by investing primarily in smaller U.S. companies, including equity securities of publicly traded companies listed on U.S. stock exchanges.

Investment Strategies: The Fund invests primarily in securities of companies that have sustainable competitive advantages, which are judged to be attractively valued based on fundamental research.

Risk

The Fund is a U.S. small/mid-cap equity fund that is suitable for long-term investors who can tolerate medium to high investment risk.

For the period ended December 31, 2020, the Fund's overall level of risk remained as discussed in the simplified prospectus.

Results of Operations

The Fund's portfolio sub-advisor is Kayne Anderson Rudnick Investment Management, LLC (referred to as the *sub-advisor*). The commentary that follows provides a summary of the results of operations for the period ended December 31, 2020. All dollar figures are expressed in thousands, unless otherwise indicated.

The Fund's net asset value increased by 18% during the period, from \$34,758 as at December 31, 2019 to \$41,085 as at December 31, 2020. Positive investment performance was partially offset by net redemptions of \$4,089, resulting in an overall increase in net asset value.

Class A units of the Fund posted a return of 32.7% for the period. The Fund's benchmark, the Russell 2500 Index (referred to as the *benchmark*), returned 17.9% for the same period. The Fund's return is after the deduction of fees and expenses, unlike the benchmark's return. See the section *Past Performance* for the returns of other classes of units offered by the Fund.

Although the global economy and financial markets began 2020 relatively strong, measures to contain the spread of COVID-19 hindered economies around the world. In response, central banks and

governments implemented massive monetary and fiscal stimulus programs, including substantial asset purchases, to support their respective economies and financial markets.

The spring economic slowdown reduced demand for commodities, which, in combination with oversupply, led to a brief period of negative crude oil prices. Equity prices fell sharply in March before rallying in response to the unprecedented stimulus programs, which kept global yields at historically low levels. The price of gold reached record highs.

Investor optimism in the second half of 2020 supported equity prices, as well as a recovery in commodity prices. Despite high COVID-19 infection rates, this optimism was fuelled by hopes of economic re-openings and progress toward the widespread distribution of effective COVID-19 vaccines. Other forces driving stronger equity prices included the resolution of the U.S. election, expectations of a trade deal between the United Kingdom and European Union, and a limit on oil output by the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (referred to as *OPEC*).

U.S. equity markets ended the period up substantially, having reached all-time highs during the period. Small-capitalization stocks outperformed their larger-cap peers, particularly in the fourth quarter. While growth stocks outperformed value stocks over the period, positive vaccine news supported a shift toward value stocks in November.

At the onset of the pandemic, companies that benefited from a "work from anywhere" environment, such as many information technology companies, outperformed those that could no longer operate as effectively. Travel-related companies, retailers, hotels and casinos staged strong recoveries in the fourth quarter despite high infection rates, however, as progress on the rollout of COVID-19 vaccines prompted investors to anticipate the eventual end of the pandemic.

Stock selection in the financials and consumer discretionary sectors contributed to the Fund's performance. A significant overweight exposure to the information technology sector also contributed to performance. Individual contributors to performance included DocuSign Inc., The Scotts Miracle-Gro Co. and MSCI Inc. DocuSign shares

strengthened as the pandemic accelerated the shift to digital document management. Scotts Miracle-Gro experienced higher demand in both its edible gardening and hydroponics segments. MSCI reported strong revenue and profit growth, and the pandemic did not affect the company's full-year guidance for 2020.

Stock selection in the health care and industrials sectors detracted from the Fund's performance. A slight underweight exposure to the communication services sector also detracted from performance. Individual detractors from performance included AMN Healthcare Services Inc., Winmark Corp. and nVent Electric PLC. AMN Healthcare reported weak results as COVID-19 halted demand for all the company's practice lines except travel nurses. Winmark franchisees had to temporarily close their stores, which reduced the company's fees and earnings.

During the period, the sub-advisor added a number of new holdings to the Fund, including Exponent Inc., Chemed Corp. and Bentley Systems Inc. Exponent provides science and engineering consulting services, and the sub-advisor believes the company's brand and reputation will enable it to generate excellent long-term returns. Chemed operates through two business segments: VITAS and Roto-Rooter. VITAS provides hospice and palliative care services, while Roto-Rooter offers plumbing, drain cleaning, water restoration and other related services. Bentley Systems sells infrastructure software and has a strong brand, as well as good market positioning.

The Fund's existing holdings in The Cooper Cos. Inc. and Elanco Animal Health Inc. were increased. Cooper gained market share during the pandemic, and the sub-advisor believes the company has a longer-term opportunity in the myopia market. The sub-advisor believes the risk-reward profile of Elanco Animal Health improved after the company's acquisition of Bayer Animal Health closed.

The sub-advisor eliminated the Fund's holdings in Primerica Inc. and RBC Bearings Inc. Primerica was sold as the Fund approached its company ownership limits. The proceeds of the RBC Bearings sale were invested in what the sub-advisor believes to be more attractive relative opportunities.

The Fund's weightings in MSCI, Aspen Technology Inc. and DocuSign were trimmed during the period in response to valuation gains.

During the period, the Fund's portfolio turnover rate had normalized, and was lower than the previous 12-month period. At that time, a change to the Fund's components resulted in a higher portfolio turnover rate.

Recent Developments

On July 6, 2020, Class F units of the Fund were made available for purchase.

The composition of the Independent Review Committee (referred to as *IRC*) changed. Don Hunter and Merle Kriss retired effective April 26, 2020. Effective April 27, 2020, David Forster and Deborah Leckman were appointed as members of the IRC. Marcia Lewis Brown was appointed Chair effective April 1, 2020.

The international spread of COVID-19 caused a significant slowdown in the global economy and volatility in financial markets. The COVID-19

outbreak may adversely affect global markets and the Fund's performance.

Related Party Transactions

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (referred to as *CIBC*) and its affiliates have the following roles and responsibilities with respect to the Fund, and receive the fees described below in connection with their roles and responsibilities.

Manager

CIBC is the Fund's manager (referred to as the *Manager*). CIBC receives management fees with respect to the Fund's day-to-day business and operations, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective class of units of the Fund as described in the section entitled *Management Fees*. The Manager compensates its wholesalers in connection with their marketing activities regarding the Fund. From time to time, CIBC may invest in units of the Fund.

Trustee

CIBC Trust Corporation, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's trustee (referred to as the *Trustee*). The Trustee holds title to the Fund's property (cash and securities) on behalf of its unitholders.

Portfolio Advisor

The portfolio advisor provides, or arranges to provide, investment advice and portfolio management services to the Fund. CAMI, a wholly-owned subsidiary of CIBC, is the Fund's portfolio advisor (referred to as the *Portfolio Advisor*).

Distributor

Dealers and other firms sell the units of the Fund to investors. These dealers and other firms include CIBC's related dealers such as the principal distributor, CIBC Securities Inc. (referred to as *CIBC SI*), the CIBC Investor's Edge discount brokerage division of CIBC Investor Services Inc. (referred to as *CIBC ISI*), the CIBC Imperial Investor Service division of CIBC ISI, and the CIBC Wood Gundy division of CIBC World Markets Inc. (referred to as *CIBC WM*). CIBC SI, CIBC ISI, and CIBC WM are wholly-owned subsidiaries of CIBC.

CIBC may pay trailing commissions to these dealers and firms, except for CIBC SI, in connection with the sale of units of the Fund. These dealers and other firms may pay a portion of these trailing commissions to their advisors who sell units of the Fund to investors. CIBC does not pay trailing commissions to CIBC SI for selling units of the Fund, although overall sales of CIBC funds may be considered in assessing the performance of their advisors and may therefore contribute to their annual compensation.

Brokerage Arrangements and Soft Dollars

The Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors make decisions, including the selection of markets and dealers and the negotiation of commissions, with respect to the purchase and sale of portfolio securities, certain derivative products and the execution of portfolio transactions. Brokerage business may be allocated by the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, to CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., each a subsidiary of CIBC. CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp. may also earn spreads on the sale of fixed income and

other securities and certain derivative products to the Fund. A spread is the difference between the bid and ask prices for a security in the applicable marketplace, with respect to the execution of portfolio transactions. The spread will differ based upon various factors such as the type and liquidity of the security.

Dealers, including CIBC WM and CIBC World Markets Corp., may furnish goods and services, other than order execution, to the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, in partial exchange for processing trades through them (referred to in the industry as “soft dollar” arrangements). These goods and services are paid for with a portion of the brokerage commissions and assist the Portfolio Advisor and any portfolio sub-advisors, with investment decision-making services for the Fund or relate directly to the execution of portfolio transactions on behalf of the Fund. As per the terms of the portfolio sub-advisory agreements, such soft dollar arrangements are in compliance with applicable laws.

In addition, the Manager may enter into commission recapture arrangements with certain dealers with respect to the Fund. Any commission recaptured will be paid to the Fund.

During the period, the Fund did not pay any brokerage commissions or other fees to CIBC WM or CIBC World Markets Corp. Spreads associated with fixed income and other securities are not ascertainable and, for that reason, cannot be included when determining these amounts.

Fund Transactions

The Fund may enter into one or more of the following transactions (referred to as the *Related Party Transactions*) in reliance on the standing instructions issued by the IRC:

- invest in or hold equity securities of CIBC or issuers related to a portfolio sub-advisor;
- invest in or hold non-exchange-traded debt securities of CIBC or an issuer related to CIBC, with terms-to-maturity of 365 days or more, issued in a primary offering and in the secondary market;
- make an investment in the securities of an issuer for which CIBC WM, CIBC World Markets Corp., or any affiliate of CIBC (referred to as a *Related Dealer*) acts as an underwriter during the offering of the securities or at any time during the 60-day period following the completion of the offering of such securities (in the case of a “private placement” offering, in accordance with the exemptive relief order granted by the Canadian securities regulatory authorities and in accordance with the policies and procedures relating to such investment);
- purchase equity or debt securities from or sell them to a Related Dealer, where it is acting as principal;
- undertake currency and currency derivative transactions where a Related Dealer is the counterparty;
- purchase securities from or sell securities to another investment fund or a managed account managed by the Manager or an affiliate; and

- engage in in-specie transfers by receiving portfolio securities from, or delivering portfolio securities to, a managed account or another investment fund managed by the Manager or an affiliate, in respect of a purchase or redemption on units in the fund, subject to certain conditions.

At least annually, the IRC reviews the Related Party Transactions for which they have issued standing instructions. The IRC is required to advise the Canadian securities regulatory authorities, after a matter has been referred or reported to the IRC by the Manager, if it determines that an investment decision was not made in accordance with a condition imposed by securities legislation or the IRC in any Related Party Transactions requiring its approval.

Custodian

CIBC Mellon Trust Company is the Fund's custodian (referred to as the *Custodian*). The Custodian holds all cash and securities for the Fund and ensures that those assets are kept separate from any other cash or securities that the Custodian might be holding. The Custodian also provides other services to the Fund including record-keeping and processing of foreign exchange transactions. The fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian directly related to the execution of portfolio transactions initiated by CAMI as the Portfolio Advisor are paid by CAMI and/or the dealer(s) directed by CAMI, up to the amount of the credits generated under soft dollar arrangements from trading by CAMI on behalf of the Fund during that month. All other fees and spreads for the services of the Custodian are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC owns a 50% interest in the Custodian.

Service Provider

CIBC Mellon Global Securities Services Company (referred to as *CIBC GSS*) provides certain services to the Fund, including securities lending, fund accounting and reporting, and portfolio valuation. Such servicing fees are paid by the Manager and charged to the Fund on a recoverable basis. CIBC indirectly owns a 50% interest in CIBC GSS.

Management Fees

The Fund, either directly or indirectly, pays CIBC an annual management fee to cover the costs of managing the Fund. Management fees are based on the Fund's net asset value and are calculated daily and paid monthly. Management fees are paid to CIBC in consideration for providing, or arranging for the provision of, management, distribution, and portfolio advisory services. Advertising and promotional expenses, office overhead expenses, trailing commissions, and the fees of the portfolio sub-advisor(s) are paid by CIBC out of the management fees received from the Fund. The Fund is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees paid to CIBC. Refer to the Simplified Prospectus for the annual management fee rate for each class of units. For Class O units, the management fee is negotiated with and paid by, or as directed by, unitholders or dealers and discretionary managers on behalf of unitholders. Such Class O management fee will not exceed the Class F unit management fee rate.

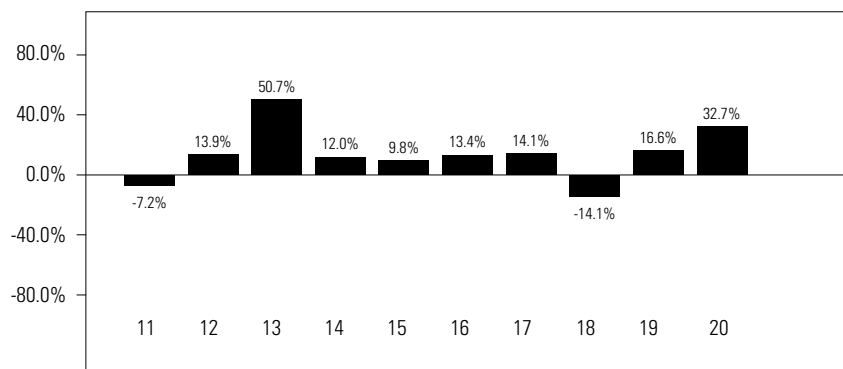

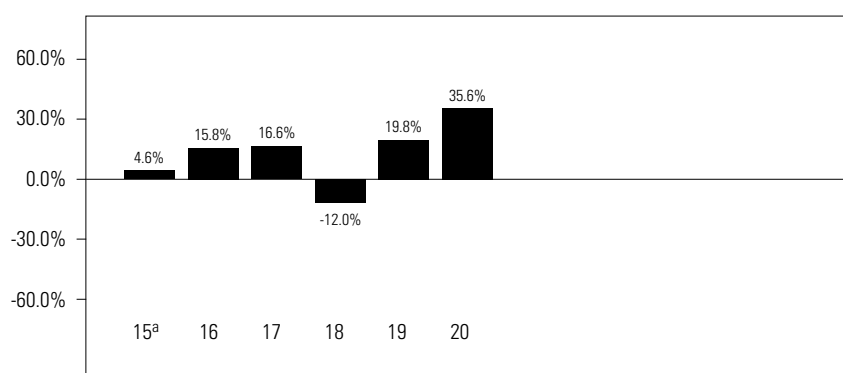
